The story of **A Fright in the Night** has been written for you to read with your child. You take turns to read:







Guidance notes

Usborne Very First Reading is a series of books, specially developed for children who are learning to read. In the early books in the series, you and your child take turns to read, and your child steadily builds the knowledge and confidence to read alone.

The words for your child to read in A Fright in the Night introduce these letter-combinations:



(Note that in standard English, oo can be pronounced either as in 'look' or as in 'moon' — both are used in this story.) It's well worth giving your child plenty of practice reading these. Later books in the series gradually introduce more letter-combinations and spelling patterns, while reinforcing the ones your child already knows.

Some questions and answers

- Why do I need to read with my child?

 Sharing stories and taking turns makes reading an enjoyable and fun activity for children. It also helps them to develop confidence and reading stamina, and to take part in an exciting story using very few words.
- When is a good time to read?
 Choose a time when you are both relaxed, but not too tired, and there are no distractions.
 Only read for as long as your child wants to you can always try again another day.
- What if my child gets stuck?
 Don't simply read the problem word yourself,
 but prompt your child and try to find the right answer together. Similarly, if your child makes a mistake, go back and look at the word together. Don't forget to give plenty of praise and encouragement.
- We've finished, now what do we do?
 It's a good idea to read the story several times to give your child more practice and confidence.
 Then you can try reading The Queen Makes a Scene at the same level or, when your child is ready, go on to Book 7 in the series.
